

Film description: Award-winning documentary *Anote's Ark* tells the story of Pacific Island nation Kiribati's fight against the existential threat of climate change. All of Kiribati's 33 coral isles and atolls will be completely underwater within this century scientists now agree. *Anote's Ark* follows former president Anote Tong as he works to save his nation, purchasing, for example, 20 km² in Fiji to relocate Kiribati islanders. The <u>award-winning</u> documentary also strikes a personal tone, following Sermary, a young mother of six, as she struggles to resettle her family in New Zealand. *Anote's Ark* has screened at a number of festivals including the Sundance Film Festival, Hot Docs Festival, and the Human Rights Film Festival here in New York.
